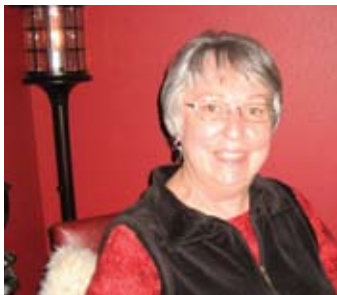

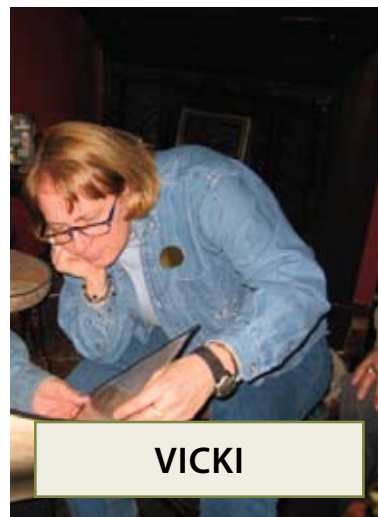

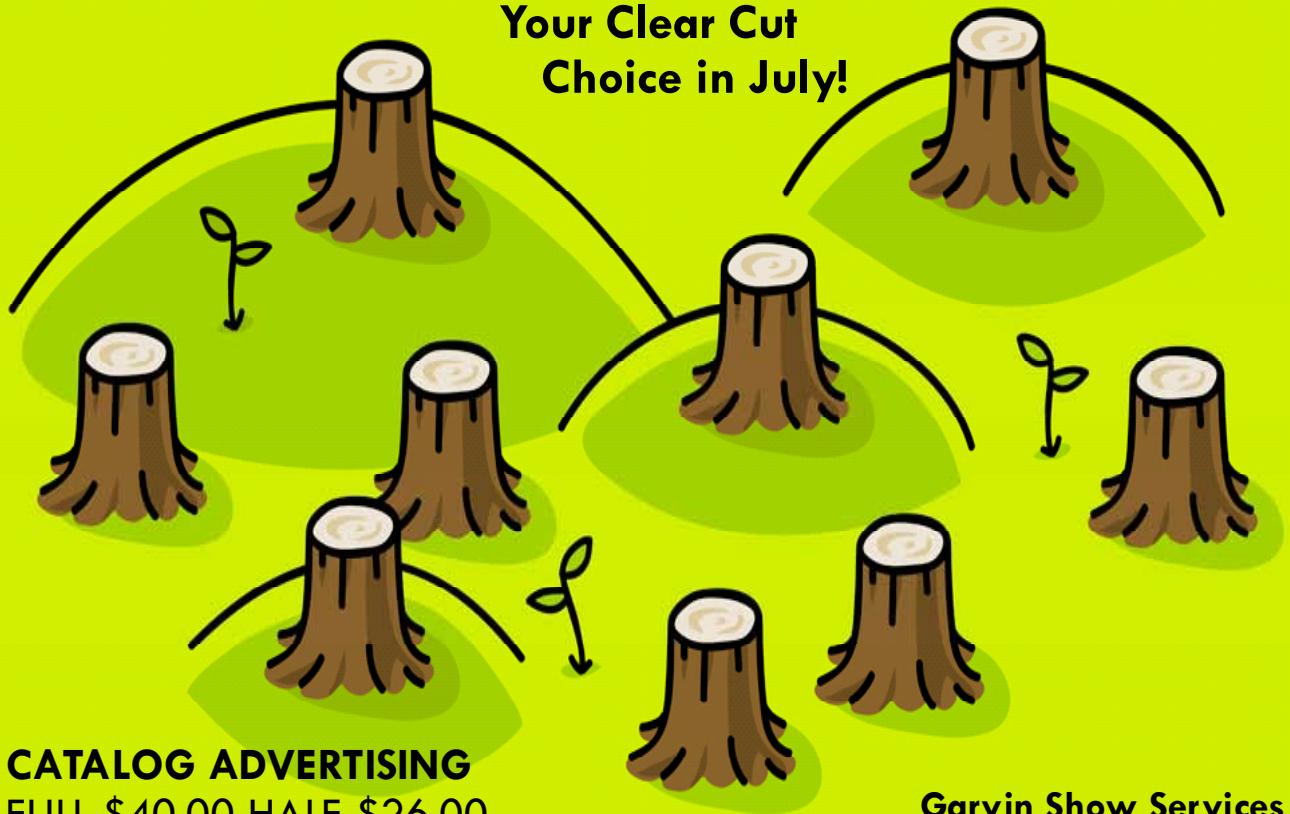

# Kula's ACL

The dogs and I were out at our favorite place, Fido's Farm near Lacey. I take herding lessons there. Before I go out to work on the sheep, all of the cairns and I take about a half hour romp in what is called the lamb field...when it is lambing time, that is where it happens. In early March, there were still a few weeks to look forward to having it available to terriers and other dogs who love to use it. We were running, usually Kula is closest to me with the other two ranging out farther and then checking back periodically, either by me calling or just them wanting to stay close.

On March 4th, after a really hard run across the field, Kula wasn't with me. I looked back and she was just sitting, looking at her back leg. My heart dropped, I knew. It was either broken or the ACL had torn. I told her to stay and walked back to her. As I got close, I called to her and she got up, but she was three legged! I grabbed her up, immediately palpating for a break. I don't know if I would have been more relieved to find one, but I didn't. I put her into her crate in the car, hoping it was simply a "zinger", I would check it after my lesson and she would be fine, I reassured myself. Just as a side note, at this point the other two were right with me. They knew something was up and had closed ranks so we were all together! They hopped right in the car and into their crates without a word from me.

After a very long 90 minute drive home, ER Vet in Kirkland confirmed my worst fear. Torn ACL! Keep her immobile. On leash to potty otherwise, no activity...oh sure! I made an appointment with my vet office, where a really good ortho guy is on staff. It actually wasn't hard to keep Kula quiet. She didn't feel very good. Some of you may have seen me blogging about this. I went out and bought a stroller so she could still go places with me and the other two.

Exactly what is an ACL and what happens when you get that diagnosis? What are the options? A normal dog's knee joint works like a hinge, keeping the animal's leg stable as it bends. When the knee has a torn cruciate ligament, the "hinge" becomes loose and no longer functions as effectively or at all. This looseness prevents the knee from maintaining stability of motion. The dog suffers pain and will develop arthritis. Usually it is a slow progressing injury, but on occasion there is very little symptom until the final tear. This is how it was with Kula. It will not repair itself. It will only get worse. The dog will learn to cope, but will always be lame. This was not okay with us. Kula is the dog I was

doing agility with and this was to be her summer to finish two agility titles!

Our option; surgery. There are several kinds. One is better suited for large dogs, the one we opted for should put us back on equipment by next spring. It is a very long, very disciplined rehabilitation. The surgery we chose is called Extracapsular stabilization stabilizes the knee joint, using a strong fibrous sheet of tissue surrounding the muscles in the outside of the leg, monofilament nylon or other suture material. These techniques are not performed inside the joint; rather, they function to counteract the instability in the joint by acting similar to an intact cranial cruciate ligament.

Kula had to wait over a month for an opening with the surgeon. The surgery took nearly three hours, it might have been longer, but her meniscus wasn't damaged (the padding inside the knee joint). She was at the vets for three days. The surgery site was an incision about 5 inches long, so when she came home, she had the mother of all bandages! It was sort of a combination of a bandage and a cast. Now the fun part. The bandage can not get wet. She can not be active, on leash to potty otherwise quiet. While she was on 5 different medications, the quiet part wasn't too hard. It has been 2 weeks now and she is feeling pretty good. The stitches all came out after 10 days, rebandaged...same admonitions regarding water and activity. The water part isn't hard, bags, rubber bands and raincoats, the activity is getting progressively more difficult. She finally feels good enough that she wants to play. This is a critical time according to the vet. She could undo everything with one wrong move. One jump, one twist...geez, this is hard!

Seven weeks, post tear and life is progressing. Probably by the time you read this we will be in rehab..Notice I said



we. This is a team effort, a huge commitment. Greg has been totally supportive, but scared to do anything wrong, so it is just my #1 girl and me. Our goal is to get those agility titles. It is possible. It won't be this year...but we will get it done!

# The History and Misconception

Note: The information in the following article came from an interview with Dr. Ian Dunbar, who spent nine years studying the social behavior of dogs during the study mentioned below. In an earlier version of this article, Dr. L. David Mech was credited with the 30-year study. This was a mistake. The researcher who conducted the study was Dr. Frank Beach. An effort has been made to correct this error. However, if you know of a place where the original article was published, please notify the editor and request a correction.

The original alpha/dominance model was born out of short-term studies of wolf packs done in the 1940s. These were the first studies of their kind. These studies were a good start, but later research has essentially disproved most of the findings. There were three major flaws in these studies:

1.. These were short-term studies, so the researchers concentrated on the most obvious, overt parts of wolf life, such as hunting. The studies are therefore unrepresentative -- drawing conclusions about "wolf behavior" based on about 1% of wolf life.

2.. The studies observed what are now known to be ritualistic displays and misinterpreted them. Unfortunately, this is where the bulk of the "dominance model" comes from, and though the information has been soundly disproved, it still thrives in the dog training mythos.

For example, alpha rolls. The early researchers saw this behavior and concluded that the higher-ranking wolf was forcibly rolling the subor-

dinate to exert his dominance. Well, not exactly. This is actually an "appeasement ritual" instigated by the SUBORDINATE wolf. The subordinate offers his muzzle, and when the higher-ranking wolf "pins" it, the lower-ranking wolf voluntarily rolls and presents his belly. There is NO force. It is all entirely voluntary.

A wolf would flip another wolf against his will ONLY if he were planning to kill it. Can you imagine what a forced alpha roll does to the psyche of our dogs?

3.. Finally, after the studies, the researchers made cavalier extrapolations from wolf-dog, dog-dog, and dog-human based on their "findings." Unfortunately, this nonsense still abounds.

So what's the truth? The truth is dogs aren't wolves. Honestly, when you take into account the number of generations past, saying "I want to learn how to interact with my dog so I'll learn from the wolves" makes about as much sense as saying, "I want to improve my parenting -- let's see how the chimps do it!"

Dr. Frank Beach performed a 30-year study on dogs at Yale and UC Berkeley. Nineteen years of the study was devoted to social behavior of a dog pack. (Not a wolf pack. A DOG pack.) Some of his findings:

a.. Male dogs have a rigid hierarchy.

b.. Female dogs have a hierarchy, but it's more variable.

c.. When you mix the sexes, the rules get mixed up. Males try to follow their constitution, but the females have "amendments."

d.. Young puppies have what's

called "puppy license." Basically, that license to do most anything. Bitches are more tolerant of puppy license than males are.

e.. The puppy license is revoked at approximately four months of age. At that time, the older middle-ranked dogs literally give the puppy hell -- psychologically torturing it until it offers all of the appropriate appeasement behaviors and takes its place at the bottom of the social hierarchy. The top-ranked dogs ignore the whole thing.

f.. There is NO physical domination. Everything is accomplished through psychological harassment. It's all ritualistic.

g.. A small minority of "alpha" dogs assumed their position by bullying and force. Those that did were quickly deposed. No one likes a dictator.

h.. The vast majority of alpha dogs rule benevolently. They are confident in their position. They do not stoop to squabbling to prove their point. To do so would lower their status because...

i.. Middle-ranked animals squabble. They are insecure in their positions and want to advance over other middle-ranked animals.

j.. Low-ranked animals do not squabble. They know they would lose. They know their position, and they accept it.

k.. "Alpha" does not mean physically dominant. It means "in control of resources." Many, many alpha dogs are too small or too physically frail to physically dominate. But they have earned the right to control the valued resources. An individual dog determines

which resources he considers important. Thus an alpha dog may

give up a prime sleeping place because he simply couldn't care less.

So what does this mean for the dog-human relationship?

a.. Using physical force of any kind reduces your "rank." Only middle-ranked animals insecure in their place squabble.

b.. To be "alpha," control the resources. I don't mean hokey stuff like not allowing dogs on beds or preceding them through doorways. I mean making resources contingent on behavior. Does the dog want to be fed. Great -- ask him to sit first. Does the dog want to go outside?

Sit first. Dog want to greet people? Sit first. Want to play a game? Sit first. Or whatever. If you are pro active enough to control the things your dogs want, \*you\* are alpha by

definition.

c.. Train your dog. This is the dog-human equivalent of the "revoking of puppy license" phase in dog development. Children, women, elderly people, handicapped people -- all are capable of training a dog. Very few people are capable of physical domination.

d.. Reward deferential behavior, rather than pushy behavior. I have two dogs. If one pushes in front of the other, the other gets the attention, the food, whatever the first dog wanted. The first dog to sit gets treated. Pulling on lead goes nowhere. Doors don't open until dogs are seated and I say they may go out. Reward pushy, and you get pushy.

Your job is to be a leader, not a boss, not a dictator. Leadership is a huge

responsibility. Your job is to provide for all of your dog's needs... food, water, vet care, social needs, security, etc. If you fail to provide what your dog needs, your dog will try to satisfy those needs on his own.

In a recent article in the Association of Pet Dog Trainers (APDT) newsletter, Dr. Ray Coppinger -- a biology professor at Hampshire College, co-founder of the Livestock Guarding Dog Project, author of several books including *Dogs : A Startling New Understanding of Canine Origin, Behavior, and Evolution*; and an extremely well-respected member of the dog training community -- says in regards to the dominance model (and alpha rolling)...

"I cannot think of many learning situations where I want my learning dogs responding with fear and lack of motion. I never want my animals to be thinking social hierarchy. Once they do, they will be spending their time trying to figure out how to move up in the hierarchy."

That pretty much sums it up, don't you think?
